Over the past 23 years, Nyaka has dedicated itself to creating lasting change in the most underserved and vulnerable communities in southwest Uganda, where HIV/AIDS and poverty had devastated countless families. This report highlights our origins as a grassroots effort to address pressing community challenges through a holistic approach, and reflects on the

progress and is a testament to a lasting change we have achieved in the lives of the people we have served over time.

At the heart of our holistic approach is the Nyaka Grandmothers Program, a groundbreaking initiative that has empowered over 23,000 grandmothers to provide care and nurture more than 92,000 orphaned and vulnerable children. What began as a simple request for women to house children attending the first Nyaka Primary School has evolved into a program that transforms entire communities. Through training, skilling opportunities, and economic empowerment, Nyaka grandmothers are not just caregivers; they are heroes rebuilding their lives while raising the next generation.

At the core of our mission is the Education Program. Over two decades, it has grown to educate thousands of orphaned and vulnerable children, with over 300 graduates who have gone on to shape brighter futures for themselves and their communities. Complementing this are Nyaka Blue Lupin Libraries, which promote literacy and a love for learning, fostering knowledge and creativity among children and adults alike.

Our impact extends to healthcare, with its community and school-based clinics providing over 30,000 consultations annually. The clinics ensure access to essential medical care, vaccinations, and family planning services, with the help of the Electronic Medical Records (EMR) that has streamlined patient management, reduced errors, and enhanced the quality of care.

Our journey towards innovation and technology has transformed the way we deliver services and achieve our mission. The Electronic Medical Records (EMR) system has revolutionized healthcare by streamlining patient management, reducing errors, and easing access to quality healthcare. In addition, we leverage digital dashboards for real-time data analysis and monitoring, enabling informed decision-making across all programs, and transparency to all our stakeholders. The Stores Management System, developed in-house, has ensured efficient tracking of stock movements and consumption rates, optimizing resource management. Similarly, the School Pay System has simplified parent/ guardian contributions, tuition and fee collection, promoting financial transparency and efficiency.

These digitized systems demonstrate our commitment to harnessing technology to drive efficiency, transparency, and impact within our communities. Our dedication to supporting innovation is a move to becoming fully paperless, streamlining operations, reducing waste, and ensuring that vital information is easily accessible and securely stored.

As we expand into other districts across Uganda, we remain steadfast in our commitment to empowering women and grandmothers, fostering resilience, and addressing the interconnected challenges of education, health, and social well-being.





Gumoshabe Claire Graduate - Makerere University

Claire's Journey of Motherhood, Education, and the Power of Support

At 24 years old, Gumoshabe Claire has defied the odds. A fresh graduate from Makerere University with a Bachelor of Science in Education, Claire's journey has been marked by resilience and the power of community support.

Raised in Kagadi District by a retired soldier and a mother who struggled to pay school fees, Claire's education nearly ended after Senior Four. However, her talent in chess secured her a scholarship at the Uganda Rural Development Training Program (URDT), opening new doors. She later joined the Nyaka AIDS Orphans Project under Beautiful World Canada's sponsorship, a life-changing opportunity that enabled her to pursue higher education. University, however, came with unexpected challenges. In her first year, Claire became pregnant. The news was overwhelming, she feared losing her scholarship and her dream of completing school.

"Truth is, it wasn't so easy to digest," she admits. Yet, with the unwavering support of her fiancé, mentors, and Nyaka, Claire found the courage to embrace motherhood.

Despite taking a one-year break in January 2021, Claire's scholarship remained intact. Her greatest surprise? She was carrying twins! "Oh my God!" she recalls, overwhelmed with joy. The journey was tough while balancing school and motherhood wasn't easy but on January 30, 2024, she graduated with a Second-Class Upper honor.

Now, Claire is giving back. She is developing a Technology Academy, where she hopes to teach coding and chess, while mentoring young girls.

"Be intentional, focus, and pray," she advises. Reflecting on her journey, she says, "If it wasn't for Nyaka, I would have lost hope."

Claire's story is proof that with determination and the right support, anything is possible.



The average annual agricultural value increased to \$591 in 2024, continuing the upward trend observed in recent years. This is a notable increase from \$561 in 2023, a significant improvement over \$550 in 2022, and a remarkable growth from the baseline value of \$318 in 2016.

In 2024, the average annual livestock asset value fell to **\$108**, a 45% drop from **\$196** in 2023 due to increased livestock theft. However, it remains above the **\$67** baseline in 2016.

In 2024, the average household annual net value rose to **\$1,479**, a 22% increase from **\$1,211** in 2023 and a remarkable **226%** rise from the **\$453** baseline in 2016.

This is well below the global poverty threshold of **19.0**, indicating continued progress in reducing multidimensional poverty.

For the past 10 years, Mary has been part of a grandmother group that empowers women through a revolving fund, provided by International Women Empowerment and supported by Nyaka. When she was given UGX 200,000(\$55), Mary saw it as an opportunity to change her family's life.


"I rented a room to sell soft drinks like soda and simple snacks like boiled eggs," Mary recalls. "I also used some of the money to buy a goat to start my goat farming business."

The goat not only helped jumpstart her business but also provided milk for her youngest grandchildren, who were left in her care at a very young age. With the profits from her business, Mary has been able to cover school fees for the children, ensuring they have access to education despite financial challenges.

The support I received from Nyaka and International Women Empowerment has truly changed my life. I am now able to care for my grandchildren, provide them with education, and sustain my business, Mary shares gratefully. Thanks to the support from Nyaka and the revolving fund from International Women Empowerment Mary's journey has been one of empowerment. She hopes to expand her business by setting up a bigger shop with more supplies, allowing her to make even more money.





Purpose

Nyaka provides communities with tools and knowledge to prevent and respond to sexual and gender-based violence (SGBV), influencing policy and societal change. Significant progress has been made in fostering informed and proactive communities that challenge harmful beliefs and promote positive practices, creating safer and more resilient environments.

Knowledge, Attitudes, & Practices (KAP Index)

Nyaka continues to engage in active collaboration with communities and government stakeholders to enhance mechanisms for responding to and preventing sexual and gender-based violence (SGBV). These ongoing initiatives have resulted in considerable improvements in the knowledge, attitudes, and practices (KAP) of community members.

A Teenage Mother's Story Of **Overcoming The Pain Of Abuse**

Teri (not her real name), a Senior Four candidate at a secondary school in Kanungu District, carries a story of unimaginable courage and resilience.

Her life took an unexpected and traumatic turn during her Primary Seven vacation. A familiar man in her neighborhood, who owned an electronics shop, lured her to his home located behind the shop. Under false pretenses and manipulation, he assaulted her, leaving her pregnant. Overwhelmed by fear and the stigma attached to such incidents, Teri kept the ordeal to herself.

When she joined secondary school in Senior One, the burden became too heavy to bear. She confided in the school matron, who advised her to seek medical help. The results confirmed her pregnancy. Efforts to apprehend the perpetrator were unsuccessful as he fled the community. Justice remains elusive, but Teri's spirit remains unbroken.

In her darkest moments, Teri found a lifeline through Nyaka's Kanungu Healing Center. With compassionate care from counselors and medical staff, she received counseling, medication, and prenatal support. Maureen, the Case Manager was a key figure in her recovery, provided unwavering support that empowered Teri to navigate her trauma.

Despite giving birth during her second term in Senior One, Teri made the courageous decision to return to school. Surrounded by a strong support system of her mother, father, and Nyaka's Healing Center, she persevered. Three years later, she is now in her final year of the first Phase of High School, determined to complete her education and build a brighter future for herself and her child.

Reflecting on her journey, Teri says, "It wasn't easy, but I knew I had to keep going. My child deserves a better future, and I want to be a mother she can be proud of. Nyaka's support gave me hope when I had none."

She also advises young girls to be cautious of men who lure them with gifts and encourages them to stand firm in protecting their dignity.

Today, her child is three years old, and Teri continues to pursue her dreams, guided by faith, hope, and her mother's steadfast encouragement.

Teri's story is a powerful reminder of why Nyaka's work matters. It is through collective compassion and support that young survivors can find healing and hope.



Over the last six years, Nyaka schools have reported a higher pass rate of **91%** for the primary section compared to the peer schools with **82%** Nyaka Vocational Secondary School has consistently achieved a **100%** pass rate, compared to the peer schools with **89%.** Overall, the examination pass rate among Nyaka-led schools has been **10%** higher than that of peer schools and **22%** above the national average.

Prioritizing Learner well-being and Welfare

The higher ratings for Nyaka students compared to their peers, across multiple domains further underscore the positive impact of Nyaka's holistic approach to supporting children's well-being.

The Self Sufficiency Index (SSI) for Nyaka-led students was maintained at **94%.** This demonstrates consistent improvements in the wellbeing of children across the five key domains: **FOOD AND NUTRITION, EDUCATION, SHELTER, ECONOMIC, and PROTECTION.**

This rating is **19%** higher than their peers and suggests that these children have a higher level of wellbeing across these important areas of their lives. The high ratings across multiple domains further underscore the positive impact of Nyaka's holistic approach to supporting children's wellbeing.

We maintained the self-reported index for meals at school at **100%** among Nyaka students, which is **46%** higher than their peers. Nyaka provides meals for all students in primary, secondary, vocational, and tertiary education, ensuring that children have access to adequate nutrition that contributes to their overall well-being. Nyaka students reported **19%** higher well-being than their peers in domains such as education, health, shelter, economics, welfare, food & nutrition, and mentorship among others. The holistic learning environment provided by the Nyaka education system, which includes tuition, stipends, and scholastic support, contributes to the overall well-being and growth of the students **Grandmother Program Data Tables**

In 2022, the average Nyaka grandmother-led household increased their daily income and earnings by 152%, putting them above the extreme poverty threshold of \$2.15, despite facing unprecedented global economic shocks.

The net worth of Nyaka grandmother-led households has increased 2.5 times compared to the baseline and is 32% higher than that of their peers.

Compared to the baseline, Nyaka grandmother-led households have a Poverty Probability Index (PPI) that is **2.6** points below the national average of 20.

In contrast, the PPI of their peers is **27.4**, down from **33.6** reported at the baseline.

Livestock asset value for Nyaka grandmother-led households has increased by 144% since the baseline, from an annual average of \$67 to \$164.

The welfare and well-being status of Nyaka grandmother-led households have improved 3.5 times faster than their peers.

This represents a 16% increase compared to their peers.

Enhancing the Wellbeing of OVCs

Nyaka uses the **OVC well-being Measurement Tool** to assess the overall well-being of a child across eleven domains. The tool captures various aspects of well-being. High self-reported indices suggest better overall well-being for the child.

2024 OVC SELF-REPORTED WELL-BEING RATING

The self-reported wellbeing rating for EDUCATION is **89%**, which is **15%** higher than their peers. This demonstrates the positive impact of Nyaka's grandmother program on children's access to education.

Nyaka-led OVCs are receiving holistic support that is **13x better than that of their peers.** Nyaka-led OVCs reported a **13%** higher rating for the COMMUNITY domain compared to their peers. Nyaka works with communities to nurture and protect children, positively impacting their overall well-being and development.



Grandmothers' Savings And Credit Access

Due to limited access to finance, rural grandmother-led households are often excluded from economic empowerment initiatives. However, Nyaka's microfinance project has allowed them to borrow up to 26% more than their savings, which is 51% more than what their peers can borrow.

Participation in microfinance activities by Nyaka grandmother-led households has significantly increased by **10%** more than their peers since the last COVID-19 lockdown in June 2021.

Understanding Our Impact Evaluation Instruments

At Nyaka, we take our impact evaluations and data management seriously. We only use tools and instruments that have been tested for validity, reliability, and effectiveness.

To assess the well-being of children, we used the CRS Orphans and Well-being tool, which measures ten key domains including food and nutrition, education, shelter, economy, protection, mental health, family, health, spirituality and community. Higher self-reported scores indicate better well-being.

For grandmother households, we adopted the Household Economic and Welfare Survey to measure the impact on income and poverty reduction.

To track progress on SGBV knowledge, attitudes, and practices, we created an SGBV community engagement survey and a learner's engagement tool, both deployed by SGBV prevention experts.

Our health survey collected patient data through our custom electronic medical records system, which is analyzed to inform our programs.

We conducted secondary data collection for our education program by interviewing teachers and administrators with our staff development, satisfaction, and welfare tool, and using the CRS OVC well-being tool for children aged 14-18 years.

In 2022, we collected over 7,000 data points using our digital data collection and reporting systems, which we use for tracking progress, accountability, program design, and impact reporting.

We seek consent from every respondent and obtain consent from minors through their parents, caregivers, or guardians to ensure data authenticity. We achieved a 99.8% response rate and validated 99.7% of the data collected. Invalid samples were discarded from analysis.

We selected respondents through randomization, which allowed for precise and accurate impact outcomes compared to simple random sampling



How We Compiled Our 2024 Impact Report

Nyaka's Theory of Change informs our impact strategy, guiding indicators and results frameworks aligned with our mission to nurture and protect children. To ensure data integrity, we engaged 60 independent data collectors from September to December 2024 and used automated data tools for Education, Grandmothers, Health, and SGBV programs since 2022.

Our MEAL team, formed in 2021, oversaw evaluation processes. Contractors were trained in digital data collection, and tools were pre-tested before fieldwork. Data was cleaned, analyzed, and reviewed internally and externally over four months. Income figures were standardized using Uganda's 2024 exchange rate (UGX 3,700/USD) and adjusted for inflation. Outliers were removed to maintain normal distribution.

We aimed for high sample sizes, achieving over 99% statistical power. In 2024, 14,210 respondents were surveyed, including OVCs, grandmother households, health program patients, and school staff. An independent third-party consultant reviewed our findings and language to ensure objectivity and credibility in reporting.









Definition Of Key Concepts

COMMUNITY: A group of families and caregivers supporting each other in raising healthy and happy children.

GROW: Progress physically, emotionally, and mentally to develop into a healthy adult.

GRANDMOTHERS in rural Uganda are typically widowed senior citizens, aged 50+ and living on less than \$0.9 per day.

HOUSEHOLD INCOME SURVEYS: data collected on living conditions and income/expenditure patterns

HOUSEHOLD INCOME: Combined gross income received within a 12-month period by all members of a household

HOUSEHOLD EARNINGS: Includes household agricultural harvest, livestock assets, livestock consumed

IMPACT: Long-term effects of an intervention on individuals or a group over time

LEARN: Absorb information through exploration, experimentation, and guidance from educators and parents.

NET PROMOTER SCORE (NPS): Customer loyalty and satisfaction measurement based on the likelihood of recommending a product/service.

NURTURE: Provide a caring and supportive environment for optimal physical, emotional, and cognitive development.

OVCs: Orphans and vulnerable children are a high-risk group facing multiple challenges **PEERS or COMPARISON GROUP:** group of people sharing interests or characteristics

PROGRESS OUT OF POVERTY INDEX (PPI): measures poverty progression based on welfare indicators

PROTECT: Create a safe and secure space for children's physical, emotional, and mental safety. **SGBV:** Sexual and gender-based violence

THRIVE: Develop resilience, emotional intelligence, and well-being for lifelong success and happiness.

WELLBEING: The state of being happy, healthy, and content in all aspects of life.

WELFARE: The physical, social, and emotional health and prosperity of a child or individual.
